A. THTR 2002 Theatre Activities IV

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course continues to advance students' intermediate skills in acting, design/tech, crew, or management through work on a major theatrical production. Students may obtain four total credits in theatre activities and may only register for one credit per semester. Registration for the credit must be during the semester in which the work is completed. Prerequisite:

Instructor approval.

- Various production techniques

For this course to transfer into the Minnesota State Transfer Pathway, a minimum of 50 hours of work must be documented.
