A. COSM 1140 Clinical II: Cosmetology

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course focuses on hair, skin, and nail care and provides an opportunity to perfect skills previously studied. Satisfactorily completed quotas accumulate to meet quota requirements. Students complete required skill readiness testing which includes shampooing, stress reliever, haircut, chemical relaxer, permanent wave, hair color, facial, makeup, eyebrow wax, artificial nails and manicure. Students perform client services and work with other students.
