A. MASS 1610 Clinical Experience and Internship

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course builds upon the knowledge, experience, and progress obtained in the Massage Therapy Program by expanding the practice of hands-on massage to outside populations. Students create an environment for practicing professional massage which include professionalism, proper business knowledge and ethics, appropriate health and business paperwork, an atmosphere conducive to massage, and behavior which shows dedication to the aspired profession. This class is the culmination and incorporation of all training received in the program and is therefore essential to the successful completion of the Massage Therapy Program. Prerequisites: Successful completion of first semester courses, enrollment in second semester courses and current cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) certification.
