B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this course students will learn proper ways to use equipment and how to determine if equipment needs to be removed from service. Students will perform regular maintenance on equipment. This course is part of the Carpentry program which is accredited by the Home Builders Institute (HBI) and the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB).

<u>CS</u>	what PPE is needed on different job setting to create safe work area?	1. demonstrate how to properly wear and care for PPE. 2. demonstrate safe work habits and properly use safety equipment.
<u>CS</u>	identify tools that need repair or that need to be removed from service.	1. correctly tag equipment that is not in good working condition. 2. identify tools and equipment that need repair or removal from service.
