A. THTR 1120 Stage Make-up

B. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to the skill and art of make-up design and application for actors on the stage or screen. Starting with the basic fundamentals of youth and age and continuing through special effects of latex and prosthetics, the student will use skills acquired to enhance character development.
